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1 Introduction

1.1 Object

This document describes the usage of **ASPRO**, the JMMC general software for preparing interferometric observations. A dedicated version of this software, **ASPRO-VLTI**, allows users to simulate VLTI observations with the setups offered by ESO for the upcoming Observing Period.

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2 Overview

2.1 Brief functional description

ASPRO is designed to simulate/prepare observations with a variety of long baseline optical interferometers. Some prior knowledge of interferometry is preferable, though not mandatory, to take full advantage of the software. Users interested only in simulating observations with the currently supported configurations of ESO/VLTI (with the AMBER or MIDI instruments) are encouraged to use **ASPRO-VLTI**, a dedicated software based on **ASPRO** but in which many of the detailed features in **ASPRO** are transparent to the user. Note that **ASPRO** and **ASPRO-VLTI** are part of a single package (also named **ASPRO**).

ASPRO provides tools to check the object observability with a given interferometer, taking into account both the location of the target in the sky and the technical limitations induced by the limited extent of the delay lines of the array. After the user has selected an interferometer/instrument combination and defined the geometrical properties of his/her target, ASPRO allows to determine the optimal array configuration and interferometric calibrators to achieve the user's astrophysical goals. The optimization is performed through estimating synthetic interferometric observables (visibilities) as well as through fitting theoretical models on these quantities. The fitting process takes into account the measurement errors of the interferometric signal based on the instrument's ETC, when available, or a rough estimate based on past observations.

ASPRO is organized as a suite of five main successive modules, which are briefly presented below and described in more details later in Sect. 3. The five modules are:

- WHEN: to define the date and time of the simulated observation
- WHERE: to select the interferometer (and instrument)
- WHAT: to define the target properties (name, coordinates, photometry and model of its geometry);
- OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE: to define the VLTI configuration to be used in the observations;
 this includes defining both the exact telescope array and the instrumental setup;
- MODEL/FIT: to calculate and plot interferometric observables and their associated uncertainties, and to fit parametric models to the synthetic interferometric signal.

The UV coverage of the object is provided by the OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE module, along with an estimate of the object observability. With the MODEL/FIT module, the user can readily estimate if observing the target in the requested configuration will yield visibilities that are accurately measurable and that vary significantly as a function of time, for instance. In addition, this module allows the user to estimate whether the observations would yield tight constraints on the geometrical model of the source, possibly leading to the exclusion of some models, for instance. In addition to these outputs, ASPRO also provides a tool to search for adequate interferometric calibrators in the WHAT module; the user is provided with a list of possible calibrators, along with a number of relevant properties, from which the most appropriate ones can be selected.

2.2 System requirements

ASPRO is run remotely through the JMMC website. It is normally run as a Java2 applet, which means that the appropriate Java plug-in (version 1.1.2 or higher) must be installed. If it is not installed, please install the computer-specific plug-in first (see http://java.sun.com).

ASPRO can be used in *anonymous* or *authenticated* mode. Authenticated mode permits to exchange files with the server and retrieve previously stored files. When launching **ASPRO** anonymously, the user connects to one of the 16 **ASPRO** visitor accounts available. If all accounts are already being used, the application will not start and the user must try again later. All connections use one IP port in the range 50000-52500. In case of systematic failure to start the application, the user must check that he/she is not working in front of a firewall that blocks part of this port range.

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An alternative method to start **ASPRO** is to launch it as a Java Webstart application, also available from the JMMC website. This only requires the installation of Java Runtime Tool Kit on the user's computer, also available from http://java.sun.com.

The **ASPRO** GUI has been created by JMMC based on Java and XML technologies. The use of the GUI should be totally transparent to the user; if necessary, a document describing the basic principles of the XML-based GUI is available from the JMMC website. Additional information on how to set up your computer to use Java properly can be found at http://www.mariotti.fr/java_infos.htm.

3 Using ASPRO

This section describes how to launch the whole **ASPRO** package and to use the full **ASPRO** interface, which is only a part of this package. If problems occur while running **ASPRO**, check here for possible errors in selecting options or providing information to the software. Furthermore, right-clicking (<CTRL>-click for Macintosh users) on a variable/parameter name in any panel brings up a brief explanation of its nature and possible values. In addition, use the Help buttons available in each **ASPRO** panel. If no solution to a problem can be found there or in the **ASPRO** FAQ webpage on the JMMC website, please send an email to the JMMC User Support group (user-support@mariotti.ujf-grenoble.fr) with a detailed description of the problem (including input parameters and error messages appearing in the LOG window, if any).

3.1 Launching the ASPRO package

3.1.1 The launcher applet

To start a new **ASPRO** session, click on the Start the Application Launcher Applet icon/link in the **ASPRO** webpage. If the appropriate Java2 applet is installed (see Sect. 2.2), an **Application Applet** window will appear on the user's screen (see left part of Fig. 1). Select **Help** under the ? menu for a basic description of the usage of the applet. Note that, at this stage, the **ASPRO** software has not yet been started; the Java applet has only initiated a new "session", from which it is possible to start the entire suite of JMMC softwares, including **ASPRO**.

3.1.2 Anonymous vs. authenticated login on the ASPRO server

The user can decide to launch **ASPRO** either anonymously (default option offered by the **Application Applet** window) or using a pre-defined username. First- or one-time **ASPRO** users can usually accommodate using the anonymous login option. For frequent **ASPRO** users and/or for repeated use of some custom input/setup files, the use of a personal account is usually more appropriate. Note that it is possible

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to upload and retrieve files when using anonymous login; however, it is not possible to recover files created during previous uses of **ASPRO**.

3.1.3 Setting a personal account on the ASPRO server

Setting a personal account can be done simply by subscribing to the aspro-users mailing list. After sending an email to sympa@mariotti.ujf-grenoble.fr (with sub aspro-users in the subject line), the user will receive a confirmation email containing his/her username and password. These are the entries to provide in the Application Applet window after checking the Start application using my account informations box (see right part of Fig. 1).

3.1.4 Starting the ASPRO package

To start the entire **ASPRO** package, which includes the full **ASPRO** interface, either anonymously or after logging in with a valid username/password combination (do not forget to click on the Login button after filling the username and password fields), simply select **ASPRO** in the **Start** menu of the **Application Applet**.

When **ASPRO** is launched, one or two new tab(s) appear in the **Application Applet** window: **ASPRO** and, if the user has used an authenticated login, **File Management** (see Fig. 2). The **ASPRO** tab should indicate that **ASPRO** is now running.

3.1.5 Uploading and downloading files to/from the ASPRO server

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


Figure 3: The File Exchange windows to upload and download files from a personal ASPRO account.

If the user has started the application with an authenticated login, the Open File Exchange Panel button in the File Management tab allows him/her to upload/download files from his/her personal ASPRO account. Clicking on this button opens a File Exchange window (see left part of Fig. 3) that lists all files currently present on the user's account (it is empty when the account has just been created). Checking the Enable File Management box opens a second sub-panel in the File Exchange window (see right part of Fig. 3) that lists and allows to browse the files and directories present on the user's personal computer. To upload a file on the JMMC servers, highlight the file in the Local File System sub-panel and click on the button; the file should appear in the Remote File System sub-panel. Reversely, to download a file from the JMMC servers, select the file and click on the button after selecting the appropriate download directory. Click on the Cancel button in the Remote File System sub-panel to dismiss the File exchange window. This window must be dismissed to resume activity within ASPRO.

3.2 The ASPRO package




Figure 4: The two GUI windows that are automatically opened upon launching the **ASPRO** package: the start-up control window (*left*) and the graphical window (*right*).

Once the user has launched the **ASPRO** package, he is presented with two GUI windows (see Fig. 4): the graphic window, in which plots will be presented when running **ASPRO**, and the start-up control window. At this stage, the start-up control window contains only a **Choose** menu, from which the user actually selects the JMMC software he wants to use for this session. The possible choices are:

- AMBER, Periods 79-80
- MIDI, Periods 79-80
- Full ASPRO Interface

The first two choices represent the specific versions of **ASPRO-VLTI** available for preparing observations with VLTI for Periods 79 and 80. This version of the software is not described here; a specific Users' Manual is available from JMMC.

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The Full ASPRO Interface choices starts up the wider-scope ASPRO software, which allows simulations of observations with many other interferometers (CHARA, COAST, IOTA) as well as with configurations of VLTI with MIDI and AMBER that are not available for Periods 79 and 80 and with future VLTI instruments allowing observations with 4-, 6- and 8-telescope arrays. It is this generic software that is described in this document.

3.3 First contact with ASPRO

Once the Full ASPRO Interface has been selected, the main control window offers eight menus (see Fig. 5). The EXIT menu allows to quit ASPRO. The ASPRO menu offers several commands associated to error handling and plotting that can be used at any time while running ASPRO. The WHEN, WHERE, WHAT, OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE and MODEL/FIT allow the user to enter the five main modules constituting ASPRO (see Sect. 2.1). The OTHER module offers several helpful commands that can be used at any time while running ASPRO. All menus are described in more detail in the remainder of this document.

In addition to these main menus, the main control window contains an Help button and a button to open the LOG window in which ASPRO prints out messages as it executes commands. The content of the LOG window can be useful while troubleshooting. To the left of these two buttons is a white-background window in which ASPRO provides short statements about its status while running commands; it is usually empty when the software is idle. Finally, to the left of this window is a roundish icon whose color indicates ASPRO status: when it is green, the software is up and running and waiting for commands from the user; when it is orange, it is executing a command; when it is red, the software has run into an error and stopped. Commands can only be executed when this icon is green. If it is orange, wait for the command to be completed. If it is red (or stuck on orange for at least a couple of minutes), try using (a few times if necessary) Exit From Error Loop under the ASPRO menu (see Sect. 3.5.1). If this is not enough to restore a normal running state for ASPRO, then there has been a severe crash; it is then recommended to quit ASPRO and restart if from scratch. If the same problem occurs repeatedly, checking the content of the LOG window may provide an indication of the nature of the problem.

The buttons located in the top left corner of the graphical window (see right part of Fig. 4) represent the following, from left to right:

- Refresh Plot redraws the last plot requested in case it did not show up automatically or if the displays contains only a red square crossed by two thin white diagonals;
- **Zoom In** increases the zoom factor and provides scrolling bars to move around in the plot;
- Zoom Out decreases the zoom factor;
- Toggle Scrolling Bars On and Off adjusts the window size to the current zoom while removing the scrolling bars;
- the *Anti-Aliasing* option can be used for improving the quality of the graphical display on your computer screen.

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3.4 EXIT menu

The only command under the **EXIT** menu, **Exit**, quits the **ASPRO** software after confirmation in a popup window. After the software is shut down (the GUI windows are dismissed), the **Application Applet** window remains in the user's screen, but the **ASPRO** tab has now disappeared. The configuration of the applet window is identical to its status after the user has first started the applet (see Fig. 1); in particular, if the user had logged in with his/her personal account information, he/she has been automatically logged out. Clicking on the **EXIT** button terminates the current **ASPRO** session.

3.5 ASPRO menu

3.5.1 Exit From Error Loop

Selecting this option forces the command interpreter to return to its default idle status (i.e., green icon in the main GUI window) without executing the remainder of an aborted command. This is to be used when **ASPRO** is stuck with a red or fixed orange icon in the main GUI window; in the latter case, check in the LOG window that the last output is indeed an error message. In some cases, it may be necessary to select this option several times consecutively to unwind the command stack.

3.5.2 Ignore Error

Selecting this option forces the command interpreter to ignore (step over) the current error and to try to complete the remainder of the command. This usually does not solve problems but it may be useful in some specific cases. We strongly recommend using **Exit From Error Loop** and analyzing the error message(s) in LOG window (check for missing files, unproper parameter selection, ...), instead.

3.5.3 Clear Plot

Selecting this options clears the graphic window, starting a new plot from scratch.

3.5.4 Refresh Plot

Selecting this option redraws the last plot requested in case it did not show up automatically or if the displays contains only a red square crossed by two thin white diagonals. This is strictly equivalent to the clicking on the first icon in the top left corner of the graphic window.

3.5.5 Hardcopy

Selecting this option creates a PS file with the current content of the graphic window. The user is asked to select a name for the output file that can then be downloaded provided the user has launched **ASPRO** with his/her personal account.

3.5.6 Reset Marker Size

Selecting this option forces **ASPRO** to use the default, dot-like, markers when plots are created. This overrides the selection of **Use Big Markers**.

3.5.7 Use Big Markers

Selecting this option forces **ASPRO** to use larger markers when creating plots. This can be useful when plotting visibilities with their uncertainties, for instance, since the errorbar is as large as the default, dot-like, marker and it is therefore sometimes difficult to determine from the plot the actual visibilities. There is only one "big" marker size; selecting repeatedly this option will not increase the marker size every time. This can be overridden by selecting **Reset Marker Size**.

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3.5.8 Zoom Plot

Selecting this option increases the zoom factor in the graphic window and provides scrolling bars to move around in the plot. This is strictly equivalent to the clicking on the second icon in the top left corner of the graphic window.

3.5.9 **Zoom Off**

Selecting this option decreases the zoom factor in the graphic window, i.e., it allows to zoom out. This is strictly equivalent to the clicking on the third icon in the top left corner of the graphic window.

3.5.10 Zoom in Same Window

Selecting this option results in the new zoomed (in or out) plots to be shown in the same graphic window.

3.5.11 Zoom in New Window

Selecting this option results in the new zoomed (in or out) plots to be shown in a separate graphic window.

3.5.12 Toggle Multi-Window Display

Selecting this option allows the user to switch between several existing graphic windows to make either one of them the currently active window.

3.6 WHEN menu

This menu brings the **Date & Time Setup** panel illustrated in Fig. 6. The user must provide the *Date* (format should be DD-MMM-YY, using decimal number for days and years and English 3-letter abbreviation for months) and *Time* (format should be HH:MM:SS in the range 00:00:00 to 23:59:59) of the observations to be simulated. Once the appropriate values have been entered, click on the GD button to register the values and then on the GLOSE button to dismiss the panel.

3.7 WHERE menu

This menus allows the user to select the interferometer he/she wishes to simulate observations with. The first 8 entries represent configurations of VLTI whereas the remaining 6 represent other long-baseline interferometers. They are briefly described here.

The first 4 VLTI entries corresponds to the configurations offered by ESO for Period 76, i.e., MIDI with either the UTs or the ATs and AMBER with either 2 or 3 telescopes. Selecting one of these choices places the user in a mode of **ASPRO** very similar to that of **ASPRO-VLTI**, i.e., where a number of technical details have been set to default values so as to simplify the use of **ASPRO** for non-specialists. Users who wish to go into more details are encouraged to select the *VLT*, *N Telescopes* choice (see below), instead. The remaining 4 VLTI entries allow to simulate observations with 2, 3, 4 and 8 telescopes, respectively, independently of

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whether the configuration is currently supported by ESO. These later choices are appropriate to simulate future observations, not yet supported by ESO but that could be conducted when they become available, for instance.

The other long baseline optical interferometers supported in **ASPRO** are IOTA (3 telescopes), CHARA (2 telescopes), PTI (2 telescopes), GI2T (2 telescopes) and COAST (4 telescopes). Finally, it is also possible to select the IRAM Plateau de Bure millimeter interferometer (6 antennas) for which the same formalism applies, though with a much longer wavelength.

In the following, we describe the use of **ASPRO** after having selected the generic *VLT*, 3 Telescope configuration. Note that most of the following applies to all interferometers, with only minor array-specific details varying from this selected choice.

3.8 WHAT menu

This menu represents the third main module constituting **ASPRO**, in which the user defines the target(s) he/she wishes to observe. This can be done in several ways, which are described in detail in this section:

- properties of several targets can be stored into a catalog that remains available on the user's account (see Sect. 3.8.1, 3.8.4 and 3.8.5);
- a new target can be entirely defined by hand (see Sect. 3.8.2);
- basic properties (coordinates, photometry) of a target can be recovered from a CDS request (see Sect. 3.8.3).

In addition, **ASPRO** allows to user to define a geometrical model for his/her target(s) (see Sect. 3.8.6) and provides a tool to find the most appropriate calibrators for a given scientific target, taking into account the required accuracy on the visibilities (see Sect. 3.8.7).

3.8.1 Use Object Catalogue

Selecting Use Object Catalogue under the WHATmenu brings up the New Catalog panel illustrated in Fig. 7. This panel allows the user to load an *already existing* catalog of targets into ASPRO. If no catalog has been previously defined, the user should instead use the **Define Object Catalogue** option under the WHAT menu to define a new catalog that will be stored on his/her account.

The user must either type in the name of the catalog to be used (New catalog) or he/she can use the Browse button to navigate his/her ASPRO account. Clicking on this button brings on a File Exchange panel essentially identical to that described in Sect 3.1.5 (refer to this section for more details). The user can highlight a catalog file already located in his/her account, possibly after having uploaded it from his/her personal computer by checking the Enable File Management box. Click on the OK button to dismiss the File Exchange panel, on the GO button to actually upload the file in ASPRO and on the Cancel button to dismiss the New Catalog panel. Note that it is possible to upload catalog file even for users who logged in anonymously; the file will be lost after logging out and not available for further use, however.

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3.8.2 Single Object Entry




Figure 8: The Source List Creation Tool panel opened by the Single Object Entry menu.

Selecting Single Object Entry under the WHAT menu brings up the Source List Creation Tool panel illustrated in Fig. 8. This panel allows the user to define a single target to be used by ASPRO. Users interested in simulating observations with several targets (i.e., for survey-mode programs) should use the Define Object Catalogue option instead.

In the upper half of the panel, the user must provide the target name (Source Name, with no more than 24 characters and no embedded <space>; use <underscore> instead) and its coordinates (RA and DEC; format should be HH:MM:SS.SSS and DD:MM:SS.SSS) along with the appropriate epoch (e.g., 2000.0). The epoch can be either typed in (values outside the 1850–2050 range are not accepted; the default 2000 epoch is then assumed) or adjusted with the scrolling icon to the right.

In the bottom half of the panel, the user can provide the magnitude of the target in a number of visual and infrared bands (MV through MN). If provided here, the object's magnitudes will be propagated to several other panels of **ASPRO** that need the target brightness. If no magnitude is provided at this stage, it is possible for the user to enter them later on.

Alternatively, the coordinates of the object and some of its magnitudes can also be retrieved from the CDS database by clicking on the Query CDS By Name button (see Sect. 3.8.3).

Once the object has been entirely defined, click on the GO button to validate the target and on the CLOSE button to dismiss the **Source Creation List Tool** panel.

3.8.3 Get CDS Object

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


Figure 9: The Get Source Coordinates panel opened by the Get CDS Object menu (left) and the resulting Source List Creation Tool panel (right).

Selecting Get CDS Object under the WHAT menu brings up the Get Source Coordinates panel (see Fig. 9). Enter a case-insensitive target name (Enter CDS Source Name, with no more than 24 characters and no embedded <space>; use <underscore> instead) and click on the GO button. If the requested object name is not resolved by SIMBAD, a pop-up window presents an error message; click on CLOSE to enter a new object. If the object name was resolved by SIMBAD, the panel is dismissed and an All About My Source panel appears with the coordinates and available photometry retrieved from CDS. The object name cannot be modified in this panel, but its coordinates and magnitudes can be. Because of possible errors in the CDS database, it is recommended to check that the coordinates are correct and, if necessary, to modify them. Also, the object can be variable and the user should provide what he/she believes is most appropriate for the simulated observations. Furthermore, it is quite frequent that some magnitudes, including the ones that are appropriate for the observations are not available through the CDS and need to be provided by the user.

Once the object has been entirely defined, click on the GO button to validate the target and on the CLOSE button to dismiss the Source Creation List Tool panel.

3.8.4 View Object Catalogue




Figure 10: The latest entries in the LOG window panel after the user has selected the View Object Catalogue option under the WHAT menu.

Selecting View Object Catalogue under the WHAT menu prints out the current source catalog in the LOG window. To view it, simply click on the LOG button in the main control window and scroll down to the bottom (see Fig 10). This option is useful when the user has defined multiple sources and wants to check that he/she has selected the correct catalog before proceeding further with ASPRO.

3.8.5 Define Object Catalogue

Selecting Define Object Catalogue under the WHAT menu allows the user to define a new catalog of one or several targets. If the user has logged in using his/her personal account, the newly created catalog will remain available in the subsequent **ASPRO** sessions.




Figure 11: The **Basic Parameters** panel opened by the **Define Object Catalogue** menu (left) and the resulting **Source List Creation Tool** panel (right).

Selecting this option first brings up the **Basic Parameters** panel (see left part of Fig. 11), in which the user can provide the catalog name (Catalog File To Use, should not contain embedded <space>, use <underscore> instead; also, the sou extension should be maintained) and the number of sources of the new

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catalog (Number of Sources). Once these two entries have been selected, click on the GO button and a new Source List Creation Tool panel will appear (see right part of Fig. 11). This is very similar to the panel illustrated in Fig. 8, except that it contains several targets if the user has created a catalog with more than one source. To open and close the sub-panel corresponding to each target, click on the arrow to the left of the Source N button. Note that it is not possible to make CDS queries to recover some of the properties of the targets; this option is only available for defining a single source.

After the name, coordinates (and magnitudes) have been provided for all targets, click on each of the Source N and then on the GO button to validate the entries and on the CLOSE button to dismiss the panel.

3.8.6 Object Model

Selecting the **Object Model** option under the **WHAT** menu allows the user to define a simple analytical model to describe the geometry of his/her target(s). If a catalog of several sources has been defined and selected, the same geometrical model will apply to all targets. Note that it is not necessary to define the geometrical model of the target at this stage; it can be done later, in the **MODEL/FIT** menu (see Sect. 3.10). Also, it is not possible at this stage to use a homemade model to describe the geometry of the target(s). This is possible in the **MODEL/FIT** menu, however (see Sect. 3.10).

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


Figure 12: The **Object Simple Model** panel opened by the **Object Model** option under the **WHAT** menu.

Selecting this option brings the **Object Simple Model** panel illustrated in Fig. 12. The method offered by **ASPRO** to do this is to select one or the weighted sum of two simple parametric models for which the Fourier Transform can be calculated analytically. This choice is provided with the *Number of Functions* scroll-down menu. The list of functions, along with the appropriate sets of parameters can be found in Table 1. Provide the name of the desired functions (*Function 1* and *Function 2*) and their associated parameters (*Parameters*). **Important:** Be sure to provide 6 parameters for each function, even though less parameters are needed to describe some of them; fill in the list with 0s if necessary.

The first two parameters for all models, $\Delta \alpha$ and $\Delta \delta$, represent the angular offset from the coordinate center (i.e., the values entered for RA and Dec). This is useful when using a model that sums two parametric

functions that represent spatially-separated components of the object; for one-function models, these parameters should be set to 0 0. F_{ν} represents the normalized flux associated to the model: when using only one analytical model, set this to 1, and when using the sum of two models, make sure that $F_{\nu,1} + F_{\nu,2} = 1$. D and $D^{1/2}$ represent the diameter and FWHM of the model, respectively. The subscripts M and m indicate the major and minor axis, respectively, whereas i and o indicate the inner and outer diameters. θ is the position angle of the major axis (models E_Gauss and E_Disk) or of the binary system (model Binary). Finally, FR is the flux ratio of the binary and C_U and C_V are the coefficients defining the limb-darkening profile. This profile is defined such that the Fourier Transform of the limb-darkened disk is:

$$G(u,v) = [a (J_1(x)/x) + 1.253 b (J_3(x)/x) + 2 c (J_2(x)/x^2)] / s$$

where $x = \pi D(u^2 + v^2)$, $J_1(x)$ and $J_2(x)$ are Bessel functions, $J_3(x) = \sqrt{0.637/x}$ (sin $x/x - \cos x$), $a = 1 - C_U - C_V$, $b = C_U + 2C_V$, $c = -C_V$ and s = a/2 + b/3 + c/4.

All angular distances must be given in arcseconds (even though milli-arcseconds is a more natural unit for optical interferometry). The position angle is expressed in degrees (following the usual astronomical convention, i.e., measured East from North).

The user must also specify the name of the file that will contain the object Fourier transform and its derivatives (*Model Filename*), either by entering the desired file name or by clicking on the Browse button and selecting an already existing file with gdf extension (in which case the previous image is replaced by the new one). This file will later be used when ASPRO plots visibilities and other quantities. The user must also provide the size of this file, in terms of pixels (*Map Size (in pixels)*, 256×256 is typically a good choice) and of projected baselines (*Array Size (m)*, this should be selected to be larger than the longest projected baseline of the interferometric array). Finally, the user must indicate the *Wavelength* (in microns) at which the observations will be conducted; this is necessary to calculate the Fourier Transform of the object's geometrical model.

Once all parameters have been set, click on the GO button to validate the entries and on the CLOSE button to dismiss the panel.

3.8.7 Search Calibrators

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


Figure 13: The Search Calibrators panel opened by the Search Calibrators menu.

Selecting **Search Calibrators** under the **WHAT** menu brings up the **Search Calibrators** panel (see Fig. 13). The basic principle of this tool is to provide the user with a list of stars that can be considered as "good" interferometric calibrators. These calibrators must fulfill a number of conditions that include: proximity to the target, similar brightness as the target and well-defined radius (hence visibility). A more detailed description of the methods used by this piece of software is provided in Appendix A.

Calibrators are search for around the last target that has been defined by the user in the **WHAT** menu. If a catalog of several targets has been defined, then all targets are available in the *Science Object Name* pull-down button and the user can choose any of them. The user must provide the desired *Observing Wavelength*

to calculate the calibrators' properties at the relevant wavelength. The scientific target brightness (Science Object Magnitude in Search Band) may have been carried over from the object definition panel or typed in by the user otherwise; it is used by the software to search for calibrators of appropriate brightness for MIDI observations. The user must then specify in which band the search should be conducted (Search For Band) and the range of magnitudes for the calibrators (Magnitudes Min & Max To Search, entered as two real numbers separated by a <space> character). Then, a first set of selection criteria must be provided by the user concerning the distance to the object (Search Radius in R.A., in arcminutes, and Search Radius in DEC., in arcseconds) within which calibrators should be searched for (the default values are considered a good default choice). Finally, the Max Baseline Used is indicated to the user; if no array configuration has been selected yet, then a default value is provided. Once the search criteria are selected, click on the GO button to start the search.




Figure 14: The window presenting the results of the Search Calibrators tool.

Once the search is over, the results are presented in a new window illustrated in Fig. 14. A detailed description of the window presenting the results and of the available methods to refine the search for the most appropriate calibrators is presented in Appendix A.

Once the user has retrieve a calibrator list or has confirmed that good calibrators are available for his/her target, both panels can be dismissed by clicking on the CLOSE buttons.

Note The visibility uncertainty induced by the observation of a certain calibrator is <u>not</u> propagated by **ASPRO**. The user should remember to add this source of error to that provided by the instrument-dependent ETC, which only includes the interferometer/instrument performances.

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
3.9 OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE menu

The **OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE** menu allows the user to set up the interferometric array, i.e., to choose the telescope stations, to check the general observability of the source(s) (see Sect. 3.9.1) as well as the technical limits imposed by the limited range of the variable delay lines of the interferometer (see Sect. 3.9.2) and to plot the UV coverage that can be achieved with the desired configuration (see Sect. 3.9.3).

In the following we assume that a catalog containing 2 sources has been defined in the **WHAT** module described above. The use of **ASPRO** with a single object entry rather than a several-target catalog is essentially identical and is not described here.

3.9.1 Observability of Sources




Figure 15: The **Observability of Objects** panel (*left*) and the resulting time coverage plot (*right*).

Selecting Observability of Sources under the OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE menu brings up the Observability of Objects panel illustrated in the left part of Fig. 15. Clicking on the View Catalog button is strictly equivalent to selecting View Object Catalogue under the WHAT menu (see Sect. 3.8.4). Clicking on the Change Catalog button brings up a New Catalog panel identical to that described in Sect. 3.8.1, in which the user can either type the name of an existing catalog file or browse his/her directory to select one. The Current Source Catalog entry in the Observability of Objects cannot be modified by typing a new name; the user must instead click on the Change Catalog button. Finally, clicking on the Change Interferometer button brings up a New Observatory panel in which the user can use the Where pull-down menu to define a new interferometer for his/her observations (Note that VLT stands for VLT-3T).

In the **Observability of Objects** panel, the user must specify the minimum elevation (*Min Elevation*) above which the target(s) should be observed with the interferometer; this can be done by either typing in an elevation (in degrees) or using the scrolling icon. If the *Plot Twilights Zone* box is checked, then the observability plot will contain a dark gray area representing night-time and light dark areas representing twilight periods. If the *Add Planets to Plot* box is checked, the observability of a number of Solar System objects (Moon, Sun, Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune) is indicated in addition to that of the targets in the user-defined catalog. The user must then choose a *Fixed Delay To Add To Tel* #1 which will be associated to the first telescope defined below; this can be done by either typing a delay length (in meters) or using the scrolling icon. All other telescopes will use variable delay line to track the interferometric fringes of the object as it moves across the sky. Then, the user must specify the name of

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the stations of the interferometric array (Telescope #N Name). **ASPRO** does not check that redundant stations are selected or that the requested configurations mixes ATs and UTs; the user must check that he/she does not ask such configurations. Checking the $Time-Stamp \ DL \ Availability \ Zones$ box will result in the writing of the start and end time of the period(s) during which interferometer delay lines allow the observations of the target. Finally, the user can modify the Date of the observations using the same format as specified in the **WHEN** menu (see Sect. 3.6).

Once all parameters have been set to the desired values, click on the GO button and the target observability is plotted in the graphical window (see right part of Fig. 15). The horizontal axis of the plot represent time (local standard time and universal time are indicated on the bottom and top axes, respectively). Also indicated around the figure are the Moon phase and brightness (apparent magnitude), the date of observation and observatory coordinates. The night- and twilight-times are indicated with different shades of gray; the white area is day-time. For each target, a black horizontal line represents the period during which the object is above the minimum elevation selected above while a red line indicates the period during which the interferometer delay lines allow the observations of the target. Ideally, one would like the red line to overlap with the entire black line. If this is not the case, the user must try to change the fixed delay line of the first telescope and/or exchange the first telescope with another one, so that a variable delay line is associated to the telescope which had a fixed delay before.

Once a satisfactory configuration has been found, click on the CLOSE button in the Observability of Objects panel to dismiss it.

3.9.2 Observability Limites Due to Delay Lines



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


Figure 16: The **Delay Lines** panel (*left*) and the resulting time coverage plot (*right*).

Selecting Observability Limites Due to Delay Lines under the OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE menu brings up the Delay Lines panel illustrated in the left part of Fig. 16. Most of the entries are identical to those in the Observability of Objects panel described in Sect. 3.9.1. The difference between these two options is that Observability of Sources indicates whether the object is observable throughout its entire transit with the desired configuration, whereas Observability Limites Due to Delay Lines indicates, baseline per baseline, whether the delay lines can actually track the source. This later option is useful when the proposed configuration leads to a truncated observability due to delay lines limits, as the user can then visualize which baseline (and therefore telescope) is problematic. With this piece of information, the user can then decide to either change configuration or the fixed delay line.

Besides providing the same entries as in the **Observability of Objects** panel, the user must choose which target (*Plot For Object*) in his/her catalog he/she wants to study. After clicking on the GO button, a new plot appears in the graphic window, similar to that presented in the right part of Fig. 16. The horizontal axis of the plot represent time (local standard time and universal time are indicated at the bottom and top axes, respectively). Also indicated around the figure are the Moon phase and brightness (apparent magnitude), the date of observation, the observatory coordinates, the target name and coordinates and the fixed delay line of the array. The gray areas representing the night and twilights are shown if the *Plot Twilight Zones* box has been checked. The top black line represent the object elevation above horizon, with tickmarks every 15 degrees. The middle lines represent, for each baseline containing the telescope with fixed delay, the period during which the variable delay lines permit observation of the target. The lower line represent the total period of time during which the object is above the horizon (0 degree elevation) and within the reach of the delay lines. If the variable delay lines hit no hard limit, this line should be as wide as the top line; otherwise, the delay lines of the interferometer do not allow complete observation of the target with this specific configuration.

In the **Delay Lines** panel, clicking on the View VLT Stations results in a listing of all available stations of the VLT being printed in the LOG window. Along with each station name, the (U,V,W) coordinates are indicated.

When a convenient configuration has been identified and tested, click on the CLOSE button to dismiss the **Delay Lines** panel.

3.9.3 UV Coverage



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


Figure 17: The **UV Coverage** panel (*left*) and the resulting UV coverage plot (*right*).

Selecting UV Coverage under the OBSERVABILITY/COVERAGE menu brings up the UV Coverage panel illustrated in the left part of Fig. 17. To access all the parameters associated with the Plot UV Coverage subpanel, click on the arrow to the left of this button.

In this panel, the user defines his entire configuration. First of all, at the top of the panel, the target must be selected from the current catalog (*Plot For Object*), as well as the *Wavelength* of observation.

In the Plot UV Coverage subpanel, the user can modify his/her choice of Fixed Delay To Add To Tel #1 and configuration (Telescope #N Name). If the Reset Frame box is checked, a new plot presenting the UV coverage will be produced. If the box is not checked, then the plot will be superimposed on the previous UV coverage(s). This allows to visualize the result of an "observation" that include several independent sets of baselines for imaging purposes, for instance. The user must also specify the fraction of the transit during which observations will be simulated, through the Hour Angle Start/End and Min/Max Elev. To Plot entries (type in a value or use the scrolling icons). Only periods during which both the hour angle and elevation conditions are satisfied will be calculated. The user can also choose the length of the axes of the resulting UV plot (UV Range To Plot, in meters) and the frequency at which independent observations will be obtained (UV Integration Time, in minutes); note that this frequency should include the necessary time to observe a calibrator and overheads. If the Plot Aperture Size On UV Plane box is checked, each individual observation will be represented in the UV plane as a circle of size equal to the telescope size instead of as a point (note that those points that our outside the available range of the interferometer delay lines are shown as small points anyway, so that checking this box shows readily which part of the UV track is actually accessible). The user can also choose the Name of the Output PSF UV Table (either by typing it or using the Browse button as in Sect. 3.8.1). If the *Underplot a Model Image?* box is checked, the model of the target (more precisely, the Fourier Transform of its geometrical model, i.e., its complex visibility), as defined in Sect. 3.8.6 and input through the *Image Filename* entry, will be plotted along with the UV coverage. Doing so can help deciding right away whether the selected interferometer and configuration is appropriate for the observation of a given target. Finally, the user can decide which quantity to plot as a function of the UV coordinates (*Plot What*, where the possibilities include the complex visibility amplitude, phase and their derivatives) and which color scheme to use (Use Image-To-Pixel Conversion, where Automatic stands for Linear).

Once all parameters have been set, click on the Plot UV Coverage button to obtain a similar plot to that presented in the right part of Fig. 17. The horizontal axes represent the projected baselines along the

U and V axes, expressed in meters (bottom and right axes) and in unit of $k\lambda$ (top and left axes), the latter being a useful unit for optical interferometry. The selected stations and fixed delay, wavelength, object's declination and the name of the target and its geometrical model are indicated to the right of the panel, along with a sketch of the interferometer in which the selected stations are highlighted. When overplotting a new configuration on top of another one, the UV points and telescope stations are color-coded to facilitate the use of this plot. Click on the CLOSE button to dismiss the UV Coverage panel.

3.10 MODEL/FIT menu

This menu represents the fifth and last main module of **ASPRO**. It is where the user can actually simulate the observations he/she has set up in the previous modules and visualize the expected results (see Sect. 3.10.1). He/she also can fit some geometrical models to the synthetic visibilities in order to decide whether the proposed observations can help constraining the model of the source (see Sect. 3.10.2 and 3.10.3). If the user plans on using the AMBER, MIDI or GI2T instrument, he/she can select the instrument with this menu, which will load an appropriate ETC into the program that calculate visibilities (see Sect. 3.10.4, 3.10.5 and 3.10.6). In the following, we assume that the AMBER instrument has been selected; selecting MIDI or GI2T changes only a few entries. If no instrument is selected, then no ETC is offered in the **UV Model & Explore** panel (see Sect. 3.10.1) and synthetic visibilities are calculated without uncertainties (or rather, each visibility is assigned $\sigma_{|V^2|} = 1$ by default).


3.10.1 UV Plots & Source Modeling

Selecting UV Plots & Source Modeling under the MODEL/FIT menu brings up the UV Model & Explore panel. This module consists of four subpanels (described below) that allow to define the geometrical model of the target (either as an analytical or homemade numerical model), to estimate uncertainties on the interferometric observables (for certain instrument) and to plot these observables.




Figure 18: The **UV Model & Explore** panel to define the model of the target analytically (*left*) or through a user-provided a FITS file (*right*).

After clicking on the arrow to the left of the Source Modeling button, the UV Model & Source Modeling panel looks like the left part of Fig. 18. In this subpanel, it is possible to define an analytical model that represents the geometry of the target. The user must specify the name of the file that contains

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the detail of the selected UV coverage (*Template UV Table*; this should be the same as the *Name Of the Output PSF UV Table* entry in the **UV Coverage** panel described in Sect. 3.9.3) and the name the of *Output (Model) UV Table* that will contain the same updated UV table but with the calculated visibilities corresponding to the object's model. In the rest of the subpanel, the user can define the analytical model of the source in the very same way as in the **Object Simple Model** panel described in Sect. 3.8.6. If the user has already defined the model of his/her target in this previous panel, the model entries should already contain the proper values (and using this subpanel is actually not necessary). Once the model parameters are entered, click on the **Source Modeling** to calculate the interferometric observables (no plot is created at this point) and on the arrow to the left to dismiss the subpanel.

If none of the parametric models adequately describe the geometry of the target, the user can decide to use a FITS file instead, for which ASPRO can calculate the Fourier Transform using a DFT or a FFT. This can be done in the Use Homemade Model subpanel in the UV Model & Explore panel. To access this subpanel, click on the arrow to the left of the Use Homemade Model button and the panel will look like the right part of Fig. 18. As for the analytical model subpanel described above, the user must provide the Template UV Table and Output (Model) UV Table filenames. In addition, he/she must provide the name of a FITS file that contains the object's model (Your Model Data (FITS File)). This can be done either by typing the file name (if the file has already been uploaded in ASPRO) or by using the Browse button as in Sect. 3.8.1. The user-provided FITS file should have 2 or 3 dimensions. The third dimension, if present, represents independent spectral channel. This capability is not yet fully implemented in ASPRO and the software currently processes only the first slice of the input datacube. The two spatial dimensions must have the same number of pixels (i.e., square image). The FITS file header must contain a certain type of information so that ASPRO can deal with it properly. In particular, the pixel scale must be provided. Here is a possible beginning for a valid FITS file header:

In this example, the "coordinate center" (i.e., the point where the object coordinates apply) is located at the center of the 512×512 image, and each pixel is 0.1 milli-arcsecond (or 0.48×10^{-9} radian) on the side. Once the name of the FITS file is provided, check the *Use the Slow, Accurate DFT* box if necessary (DFT is to be preferred to FFT under most circumstances, especially as calculation time is rarely a critical aspect in **ASPRO**), click on the Use Homemade Model button to calculate the Fourier transform of the model and the interferometric quantities corresponding to the UV coverage, and on the arrow to the left of it to dismiss the subpanel.





Figure 19: The UV Model & Explore panel with the ETC[AMBER] subpanel opened.

At this point, the synthetic visibilities and phases corresponding to the object's model and to the UV coverage have been calculated. If one of the instruments for which an ETC is implemented in ASPRO has been selected (here we assume that AMBER has been selected), the user now can estimate uncertainties on these quantities. To do so, click on the arrow to the left of the ETC [AMBER] button, which will open that subpanel; the UV Model & Explore panel then looks like that illustrated in Fig. 19. In this subpanel, the user defines the expected observing conditions as well as the instrumental setup. With AMBER, the user must specify the Observing Band (note that ASPRO does not check the coherence between this selection and the wavelength used to define the UV coverage of the source), the Spectral Resolution, the Seeing Conditions (either using the Average/Excellent pull-down menu or providing a value for R₀ in centimeters), the Telescope Type, the Star Magnitude at the observed wavelength, the Percentage Of Time Spent On Science (20% is typical for AMBER observations) and the name of UV Table To Update With Computed SNR, which should be the same as the Output (Model) UV Table entry described above. If the user has selected the MIDI instrument, he/she will have to specify the Number Of Spectral Channel to be averaged together to increase the SNR, and if it is GI2T, then the Spectral Bandwith (in microns) must also be specified. Once all parameters have been set, click on the ETC [AMBER] button to calculate the uncertainties and on the arrow to the left of it to dismiss the subpanel.




Figure 20: The **UV Model & Explore** panel to plot synthetic interferometric observables (left) and the resulting visibility plot (right).

It is now possible to plot the simulated interferometric observations. To do so, click on the arrow to the left of the UV Explore button to open this subpanel (see left part of Fig. 20). The user must first indicate

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the UV Table Name To Explore (this should be the same as the Output (Model) UV Table and UV Table To Update With Computed SNR entries described above) and can also decide which quantities to plot (X data and Y data for the horizontal and vertical axes, respectively); the possible choices are listed in Table 2 along with a brief description. Selecting V for Y data and U for X data will produce a plot very much similar to the one shown in Fig 17. Checking the Add Errorbars to Plot box enables uncertainties to be plotted. The limits of the plot along both axes (*Plot limits*; X_{min} X_{max} Y_{min} Y_{max} in that order) can either be chosen by the user or automatically computed (which is achieved with the default 0 0 0 selection). The user can also choose to check the *Plot Model Curve* box, which superimpose on the calculated visibilities, the theoretical visibilities as a (set of) continuous red curve(s). If the model is axisymmetric, only one curve appears when plotting AMP^2 as a function of RADIUS; if the model is non-axisymmetric or when plotting quantities as a function of ANGLE, numerous curves appear, corresponding to different position angles or radii in the Fourier domain. Checking the *Underplot Model Image* box will result in plotting the Fourier transform of the object's model if the choice of X data and Y data permits it (i.e., if U and V are selected). The user can also select the name of the file that will contain the created plot in GILDAS format (This Image Filename, provided either by typing it or using the Browse button; a gdf filename extension is assumed), the quantity to plot as a function of the UV coordinates (*Plot What*, where the possibilities include the complex visibility amplitude, phase and their derivatives) and which color scheme to use (Use Image-To-Pixel Conversion, where Automatic stands for Linear). These latter two options are relevant when the *Underplot Model Image* box has been checked.

If the plotted visibilities (or other quantities) appear unsatisfactory to the user, for instance because they do not change enough with time or because they are too small to be confidently measured, the user should try to change his/her instrumental setup and array configuration. Otherwise, simply click on the arrow to the left of the UV Explore button to dismiss the subpanel and on the CLOSE button to dismiss the whole UV Model & Explore.

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


Figure 21: UV Fit Control Panel (left) and result window (right) for the Fits In the UV Plane menu.

3.10.2 Fits In the UV Plane

This menu allows the user to fit an analytical model to the synthetic visibilities and uncertainties (when available) created in the **UV Plots & Source Modeling** menu. Along with a best fit model, uncertainties on the parameters are provided, giving an indication as to whether the proposed observations can help constraining the geometry of the target.

Selecting the **Fits In the UV Plane** menu opens the **UV Fit Control Panel** panel illustrated in the left part of Fig. 21. Clicking on the arrow to the left of the **UV Fitting** button opens this subpanel, which allows to fit an analytical model to an existing model-populated **UV** table. The user must provide the input *UV Table Name* (typing the filename or using the **Browse** button), the range of **UV** coordinates over which to perform the fit (*UV Range*, representing by the minimum and maximum projected baselines to be fit, separated by a **space**) and the parametric model to be fit. This can be one or the weighted sum of two simple parametric models. Use *Number of Functions*, *Function 1*, *Function 2* and *Parameters* in the same way as in defining the object model (see Sect. 3.8.6). In addition, the user can provide a range of possible values for the model parameters (*Starting Range*) and a number of (evenly-spaced) values to test throughout that range (*Numb. of Starts*; -1 means that the parameter is fixed to its prescribed value and 0 provides an automatic fit). If a variable is not fixed, then the value listed in *Parameters* is a first guess from which the iterative fitting process starts.

Clicking on the the UV Fitting button, the fit is performed and a pop-up [Results] window appears. This window presents the results of the fit (see right part of Fig. 21). At the bottom of that window, the result of the fit is summarized as follows, with a first line providing the r.m.s of the fit (presented in flux units), a qualitative indicator of the goodness-of-fit. The rest of the results are presented with one line per model parameter following the format:

Model_Name Variable_Name Best_Fit (Uncertainty)

If the parameter was held fixed, the Uncertainty entry reads fixed instead of a numerical value. In the example presented in Fig. 21, a C_GAUSS model was fit to visibilities created using a C_DISK model. Note that fitting the same model as the one used when creating the UV table results in the original parameters being exactly (infinite accuracy) recovered since no extra noise is added to the simulated visibilities (the r.m.s. value is then 0.0). Also, this fitting can be performed even though no visibility uncertainties have been estimated, providing only an indicative fit.

The **Plot Fit** subpanel of the **UV Fit Control Panel** panel is still under construction and is not described here. Once done with fitting the simulated observations, click on the **CLOSE** button to dismiss this panel.

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3.10.3 Model Parameter Errors Calculator

This menu allows the user to fit an analytical model to the synthetic visibilities created in the **UV Plots & Source Modeling** menu. Along with a best fit model, uncertainties on the parameters are provided, giving an indication as to whether the proposed observations can help constraining the geometry of the target. This is an alternative, though not as realistic (visibility uncertainties are not taken into account here) to the algorithm used in the **Fits In the UV Plane** menu. However, the **Model Parameter Errors Calculator** fitting procedure does not provide a quantitative estimate of the goodness-of-fit and it is usually not possible to decide whether a certain model fits better the data than another one. We strongly recommend the use of the **Fits In the UV Plane** menu instead.






Figure 22: The Model Parameters Errors Calculator panel (*left*) and the resulting Result panel (*right*).

This menu is still under construction and is based on a module developed for ASPRO-VLTI. The Model Parameters Errors Calculator panel is illustrated in the left part of Fig. 22. Consequently, the user should not use the Back To Source Def, Back To Obs Setup and Back To Visibility Panel buttons. The user only needs to define the parametric model to be fit, which can be one or the weighted sum of two simple parametric models. Use Number of Functions, Function 1, Function 2 and Parameters in the same way as in defining the object model (see Sect. 3.8.2). For each function, the user can decide whether or not to fix the parameter value to his/her initial guess rather than letting it vary; this is done using the Masked Parameters entry. This can only take values of 0 (free parameter) or 1 (fixed parameter). The fit is performed iteratively from the initial guess (Parameters entries) in a way that does not take into account the visibility uncertainties. It is therefore not representative of an actual observation/analysis procedure and should not be considered as a strong result by the user.

Clicking on the GO (Perform MPEC) button starts the fitting process and the results are presented in a new Result panel. Scrolling down this window, the user can find a series of lines corresponding to each model parameter (see right part of Fig. 22). For those parameters that were held fixed, the entry reads Fixed; for those which vary, a Stdev entry is followed by a number, which is the estimated uncertainty on the parameter. In the example illustrated in Fig. 22, a uniform disk function is fitted, which can be represented with 4 parameters (two for the location, the total flux and the radius). Here, the flux is recovered with an accuracy of 1.4% and the radius with an accuracy of 3.7%. Note that if the flux had been held fixed, the accuracy on the radius would have been significantly lower, on order 2.2%.

When the fit is performed, click on the CLOSE button to dismiss the panel.

3.10.4 Select Instrument AMBER

Selecting Select Instrument AMBER under the MODEL/FIT menu loads the AMBER-specific ETC into the module that calculates the synthetic visibilities (see Sect. 3.10.1).

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3.10.5 Select Instrument MIDI

Selecting **Select Instrument MIDI** under the **MODEL/FIT** menu loads the MIDI-specific ETC into the module that calculates the synthetic visibilities (see Sect. 3.10.1).


3.10.6 Select Instrument GI2T

Selecting **Select Instrument GI2T** under the **MODEL/FIT** menu loads the GI2T-specific ETC into the module that calculates the synthetic visibilities (see Sect. 3.10.1).

3.11 OTHER menu

3.11.1 Show Current Setup




Figure 23: Current setup panel (left) and image display panel (right) obtained from the **OTHER** menu.

This menu opens a **Status** window in which the basic properties of the observation being simulated are summarized (see left part of Fig. 23). The information provided includes the interferometer, instrument, array configuration, current object, wavelength and name of a few key files for **ASPRO**. No modifications to the setup can be performed from this panel; it is exclusively informative but provides an overview of what has been selected by the user so far. Note that many variables have default values, so that no parameter presents an empty field even at the time **ASPRO** is launched (the only exception being *Model File*, which represent the name of the user-provided FITS model of the object). Click on CLOSE after reviewing the parameters (the panel will be automatically dismissed once another module is opened).

3.11.2 Plot Current Interferometer Setup

Selecting this options results in a new plot that represents a sketch of the selected interferometer along with the name of the offered stations. Each telescope of the array is represented with its actual size.

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3.11.3 Show Plot In Browser (PS file)

Selecting Show Plot in Browser (PS File) under the OTHER menu creates a PS file containing the current content of the ASPRO graphic window. The file is automatically displayed by the user's browser and, simultaneously, stored in the user's ASPRO account where it can later be retrieved.

3.11.4 Show Plot In Browser (PDF file)

Selecting Show Plot in Browser (PDF File) under the OTHER menu creates a PDF file containing the current content of the ASPRO graphic window. The file is automatically displayed by the user's browser and, simultaneously, stored in the user's ASPRO account where it can later be retrieved.

3.11.5 Display a GILDAS or FITS Image

Selecting **Display a GILDAS** or **FITS Image** under the **OTHER** menu brings up the panel illustrated in the right part of Fig. 23. The user must specify the *File Name* of the image to plot (the extension, e.g., gdf for a GILDAS format image, should be removed from the filename) as well as the *File Type*; the latter will be assumed to be the extension of the filename. Clicking on the **Display Current Image** creates the plot in the graphic window, using a default linear scale from two automatic values. If the user wants to change the limits of the color scale, or its nature (linear, logarithmic or histogram equalization), he/she should check the *Use Optional Parameters* and specify the *Low Cut* and *High Cut* values, as well as the *Scaling Mode*. Clicking on the **Show Current Header** results in the file's header being printed in the LOG window. Click on the **CLOSE** button to dismiss the panel when done.

3.11.6 List UV Table Content




Figure 24: The List a Table Content panel (left) and the resulting UV table listing (right).

Selecting this option brings the **List a Table Content** panel illustrated in the left part of Fig. 24. The user must specify the name of the UV table he/she wants to list (*Input Table*, must be file with a uvt extension), as well as the name of a text file (*Output List File*) in which the UV table will be saved for future usage. Both entries can either be typed in or the filenames can be indicated using the **Browse** buttons as in Sect. 3.8.1. Once the filenames are provided, click on the GD button, and the UV table is presented in a new pop-up window (see right part of Fig. 24). The file contains one line per measurement and per individual baseline. Each line contains the UVW projected baseline coordinates, a dummy observation date, the time since the beginning of observations (in seconds), the code for the two telescope stations, the real and imaginary part of the complex visibility and its weight (i.e., its uncertainty).

3.11.7 Export File

Selecting **Export File** under the **OTHER** menu brings up the **Export a File** panel illustrated in the left part of Fig. 25, which allows to transform a GILDAS-format image into a FITS file. The user must indicate the name of the *Input GILDAS File* and of the *Output FITS file*, either by typing them or by using the

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Browse button as in Sect. 3.8.1. The *FITS Flavour*, i.e., the type of FITS file, must be indicated. When all parameters are set, click on the GO button to export the file, and on the CLOSE button to dismiss the panel.

3.11.8 Import File

Selecting **Import File** under the **OTHER** menu brings up the **Import a File** panel illustrated in the right part of Fig. 25, which allows to transform a FITS file into a GILDAS-format image. The user must indicate the name of the *Input FITS File* and of the *Output GILDAS format file*, either by typing them or by using the Browse button as in Sect. 3.8.1. The *FITS Flavour*, i.e., the type of FITS file, must be indicated. When all parameters are set, click on the GD button to export the file, and on the CLOSE button to dismiss the panel.

3.11.9 Export UV Table as OLFITS

Selecting Export UV Table as OI_FITS under the OTHER menu brings up the Export an UV Table as OI FITS panel, in which the user can provide the name of a UV table (.uvt extension) and export it in a standardized OI_FITS file, which can be downloaded from the JMMC server for further use. Click on the GO button to perform the conversion and on the CLOSE button to dismis this panel.

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A SearchCalibrators Tool

A.1 Goals

SEARCH CALIBRATOR builds a dynamical catalogue of stars with all useful information for the selection of the calibrators most adapted to the requirement of the astrophysical program.

A.2 Method

Two methods are used, one specific for the N band (e.g., the MIDI instrument of ESO), one used for the VJHK bands (suitable for the AMBER instrument in J,H and K).

A.2.1 N-Band case

Definition of calibrator field The maximum angular distance (in RA and DEC) of calibrators from the object is given by the user.

Flux constraints Three cases are considered for the range of magnitude of the calibrators following the object brightness (see Table 3).

List of possible calibrators The program finds the possible calibrators in the list of mid infrared interferometric calibration sources established by van Boekel et al. (2005). The result is a list of stars with known parameters in astrometry (equatorial and galactic positions, proper motion, parallax), spectral classification, photometry as well as indication of variability and multiplicity and computed value of the measured angular diameter. For each calibrator, the squared visibility $(V_{cal}^2, \Delta V_{cal}^2)$ is computed as function of the angular diameter, wavelength and maximum baseline.

A.2.2 Other Bands

Definition of calibrator field The search is based upon user-specified criteria of angular distance and magnitude around the Scientific Object.

List of possible calibrators The program sends a request to the CDS database using "scenarios" based upon the selected photometric band (K). The result is a list of stars with known parameters in astrometry (equatorial and galactic positions, proper motion, parallax), spectral classification, photometry (Johnson magnitudes) as well as indication of variability and multiplicity and known value of the measured angular diameter. For each star, the angular diameter is computed using a surface brightness method and color index calibration using V magnitude and (B-V), (V-R) and (V-K) color index. For each star, the squared visibility $(V_{cal}^2, \Delta V_{cal}^2)$ is computed as function of the angular diameter, wavelength and maximum baseline.

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Post processing of the calibrators A coherence test of the photometry is done by comparison of the computed diameters from the different color index. The star is rejected if one of the computed diameter differs more than 2σ from the mean value.

A.3 Further selection of the calibrators

It is possible, once the list of calibrators has been constructed, to refine the choice of the calibrators using several selection criteria:

- field size around the science object
- object-calibrator magnitude difference
- spectral type and luminosity class
- accuracy on the calibrator visibility
- information regarding the calibrator variability and multiplicity

A.4 Results of the SearchCalibrators tool




Figure 26: Result Panel

Once the CDS request is answered, a Result Panel pops up (fig. 26).

A.4.1 Initial selection

The panel consists in three sections, the Science Star window, the Results window and a set of subpanels allowing a refinement of the selection of the calibrators based on various selection parameters.

The **Science Star window** shows the parameters of the Science object: name, position (RA, DEC), N magnitude and maximum baseline, computed angular diameter (K Band).

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The **Results window** shows the list of the calibrators without any indication of variability or multiplicity. Only some selected parameters are given (see table 5 for JHK results, 4 for N-Band results), unless the SHOW DETAILS button has been activated. By clicking on the name of the column and dragging the column, it is possible to personalize their order.

The top border of the panel presents 4 buttons:

RESET: button to show the full list of the potential calibrators.

SHOW ALL RESULTS button to display the full list of the potential calibrators, including those which are variable, multiple of that have inconsistent diameters (which are excluded from the default list).

SHOW DETAILS button to display the full list of measurements returned by the program. All available parameters are given in Tables 6 and 7 for N and JHK band search respectively).

HIDE DETAILS button to display only the principal measurements returned by the program. Only some selected parameters are given (Tables 5 and 4).

The lower part of the panel is a set of selection tools used to refine the list of calibrators and load/save results.

SELECT CALIBRATORS is described below in sect. A.4.2.

DELETE to delete a star of the list. Click the arrow, enter the number of the line to be suppressed, click the **DELETE** button.

LOAD to load a result saved as a file. Click the arrow, enter the name of the File (name.scl), click the **LOAD** button.

SAVE to save in a file all the information of the list of calibrators. Click the arrow, enter the name of the File (name.scl), click the **SAVE** button. Retrieving this file is possible within the File Exchange Panel (see sect. ??)

EXPORT CSV to save in a file the list of calibrators as displayed in the results window. Click the arrow, enter the name of the File (name.csv), click the **EXPORT** button. Retrieving this file is possible within the File Exchange Panel (see sect. ??)

EXPORT VOT to save in a file the list of calibrators as displayed in the results window in the VOTable format¹. Click the arrow, enter the name of the File (name.vot), click the **EXPORT** button. Retrieving this file is possible within the File Exchange Panel (see sect. ??)




Figure 28: Field Selection Tool

2. Maximum magnitude difference (Science Object - Calibrator)




Figure 29: Maximum magnitude difference Selection Tool

3. Spectral Types (Temperature class) of the Calibrators




Figure 30: Spectral Types Selection Tool

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


Figure 31: Luminosity class Selection Tool

5. Maximal expected accuracy on the calibrator visibility $(\Delta V_{cal}^2/V_{cal}^2$ in %)




Figure 32: Maximal expected accuracy Selection Tool




Figure 34: Multiplicity Selection Tool
